Welcome to 14 Millstone Court.

This delightful property was completely refurbished in May 2019 and I hope that you will enjoy your stay. Please feel free to make yourself at home.

Portstewart

The eastern end of the Promenade has a small harbour. Whilst the Dominican convent sits on the edge of a cliff dominating the western end of the Promenade.

Just west of the town stretches Portstewart Strand, a clean two-mile long blue flag beach, protected by the National Trust and loved by surfers.

The cliff path has panoramic views across the Strand and Downhill with Donegal in the background.

The Barmouth is a sanctuary for waders, wildfowl and nesting birds. Beyond the Barmouth lies Castlerock, Mussenden Temple, Benone Strand and the Magilligan Strand.

To the east of Portstewart there is popular walking/cycling path along the coast to Portrush, the Giants Causeway, Carrick-a-Rede Rope Bridge and the Old Bushmills Distillery.

The North Antrim Coast Path starts at Portstewart Strand and continues for 40 miles along the coast to Murlough Bay.

Keys

There is a high-level security code entrance system. The code is unique to your stay. There are no keys needed for the property. There is an emergency key in case technology fails!

Each bedroom door has a privacy lock which complies with fire safety.

Internet/TV/Phone

The internet in this property is operated by BT Hub

The Television has all the terrestrial channels and is compliant for Netflix's etc. BT Sport Channels are on 408-411 and 415. There are two remote controls one is for the TV, the other switches on the BT TV box. Information on the back of the remotes as to how to operate the TV.

The phone number for the property is 02870 835612. This phone is for emergency and incoming calls only. You will not be able to make any calls from this number.

The Property The property comfortably accommodates up to 8 adults.

Covid 19

The property will be serviced before your arrival and disinfected in accordance with Covid 19 safety. If you have symptoms after arrival, please inform me immediately.

Beds and Laundry

Each bed has a mattress cover – please do not remove these. They are there for a purpose to protect the mattress.

Velux windows

Please ensure these are closed when you leave the property as rain will cause damage.

Main Bathroom

This has a shower and whirlpool bath. Please ensure children are supervised in this for their safety. There is a downstairs WC on the ground floor next to the kitchen.

Parking

There are 2 parking spaces in front of the garage. Other parking is available on the roadway – please do not block the alleyway.

Washing Machine & Drier

Washing machine and tumble drier are available in the garage. Please empty the condenser drier water bottle after use. Clothes airer and washing powder are available.

The Garden

The garden is completely secure for children. Please ensure the gate is properly closed. There is a picnic table. Do not put small B-B-Qs on the table or grass.

Heating

The heating system is on a time clock and set for an hour in the morning and in the evening (7.30am and 8.30pm) the house chills down around 9.30pm. A boost button is available.

Please do not change the time clock.

Kitchen

The Cutlery drawer is the grey drawer inside the top white drawer directly under the hob.

Dishwasher tablets and black bags are kept under the sink.

Hall Cupboard

As iron, ironing board, dust pan and brush and a vacuum cleaner are available here.

<u>Bins</u>

Please put bin out for collection during your stay on Tuesday evening for collection on Wednesday Morning. Please do not leave this for someone else to do.

Bin chart is on back page of this booklet.

Only recycle those things listed on the blue bin.

For the black bin, it is better that everything is in a black plastic refuge sack available under the kitchen sink.

Once the bin has been emptied, please bring it to the back of the property to ensure other households don't use it. If you are staying for a weekend – before you leave, please put black bags into the black bin and leave it at the front of the house.

Checkout

Checkout is by 11.00am This ensures the property is serviced for new guests. The cleaners will enter the property at 11.00am.

For your safety.

The house is fully fitted with fire doors, smoke and carbon monoxide monitors and emergency lighting. These are here for your safety. Do not disconnect them and do not wedge open doors! Please do not use candles or anything else which would be a fire hazard.

This is a no smoking property.

In Case of Fire

Please raise the alarm and exit the house by the nearest exit.

Get out, stay out, and get the fire brigade out.

Ring 999 and ask for fire service.

Exits: front and rear door on the ground floor. First floor—bedroom window at rear of the property and patio doors in lounge. Top floor bedroom two has a tilt and open window. All doors are fire doors.

Security

For your security, please ensure that the front and rear door is locked when you are in the property or when you leave.



The Giant's Causeway is an area of about 40,000 interlocking basalt columns, the result of an ancient volcanic fissure eruption. It is located in County Antrim on the north coast of Northern Ireland, about three miles (4.8 km) northeast of the town of Bushmills.

It was declared a World Heritage Site by UNESCO in 1986, and a national nature reserve in 1987 by the Department of the Environment for Northern Ireland. In a 2005 poll of Radio Times readers, the Giant's Causeway was named as the fourth greatest natural wonder in the United Kingdom. The tops of the columns form stepping stones that lead from the cliff foot and disappear under the sea. Most of the columns are hexagonal, although there are also some with four, five, seven or eight sides. The tallest are about 12 metres (39 ft) high, and the solidified lava in the cliffs is 28 metres (92 ft) thick in places.

Much of the Giant's Causeway and Causeway Coast World Heritage Site is today owned and managed by the National Trust and it is one of the most popular tourist attractions in Northern Ireland. Access to the Giant's Causeway is free of charge: it is not necessary to go via the visitors centre, which charges a fee. The remainder of the site is owned by the Crown Estate and a number of private landowners.



The Mussenden Temple. Perched on the cliffs overlooking Downhill Strand, coastal erosion has brought it closer to the edge. The temple was built in 1785 and forms part of the Downhill Demesne. The demesne was formerly part of the estate of Frederick, 4th Earl of Bristol, who served as the Church of Ireland Lord Bishop of Derry from 1768 until 1803. It was Lord Bristol – popularly known as "the Earl-Bishop" – who had the "temple" built. Constructed as a library and modelled from the Temple of Vesta in the *Forum Romanum* in Rome.

In 1997 The National Trust carried out cliff stabilisation work to prevent the loss of the building.

The inscription around the building reads:

"Suave, mari magno turbantibus aequora ventis e terra magnum alterius spectare laborem." "Tis pleasant, safely to behold from shore the troubled sailor, and hear the tempests roar."

The quotation is from Lucretius, *De Rerum Natura*, 2.1–2.

As the Bishop's library, its walls were once lined with bookcases. A fire was kept burning constantly in the basement. This and its enclosed flue meant that, even in this very exposed location, the books never got damp. The building was probably the work of Micheal Shanahan who accompanied the Earl Bishop on one of his many visits to Italy.



Portstewart Strand and Barmouth Wildlife Reserve:

Between Portstewart and the mouth of the River Bann lies the golden sands and domineering sand dunes of Portstewart Strand. This area of natural beauty and of scientific interest is owned and managed by the National Trust. A year round mecca for holiday makers, Portstewart Strand holds the prestigious Blue Flag award for the management, cleanliness and quality of water and it is also one of the few remaining beaches in Ireland where cars still have access and permission to drive onto the beach- perfect for families who wish to picnic on the golden shores. In addition to this, it has also won the Seaside Award again in 2014 .The beach attracts a range of visitors wishing to partake in activities such as, surfing, swimming, horse

riding and scenic walks on the way marked nature trails with excellent views of the North Coast.

Visitors to the beach will benefit from new toilets, external showers and improved first aid facilities. A new shop will enable visitors to pick up accessories for the beach, such as bucket and spade or games to play, or a souvenir to take home with them. All income generated from the shop will go towards the conservation of this special area.

The White Rocks

The limestone cliffs of the White Rocks stretch from Curran Strand to Dunluce Castle. You can take a boat trip into these soft, sedimentary rocks have been carved through centuries into a labyrinth of caves and arches. Shelagh's Head, the Wishing Arch, Elephant Rock and the Lion's Paw are headlands of distinguishable forms which rise out of the ocean.

Ballycastle Beach

The coast of north Antrim is spectacular, boasting the Giant's Causeway, the gateway to the Glens of Antrim and Ballycastle beach, with views on a clear day over to the Mull of Kintyre. The sand beach is set in a bay framed to the east by sheer 600ft cliffs, while to the west the ruins of Kinbane Castle sit on an imposing limestone outcrop. The sand is slightly coarse and gravelly, which makes it perfect for both sandcastle making and walking if you don't want to swim - which you can do in the shallows with relative safety despite there being no lifeguard cover. There's a promenade and seafront at Ballycastle with tennis courts, and an inner harbour and marina. In the distance offshore sits the small inhabited island of

All doors are fire doors and no wedges are available for rooms.

All doors self close as per fire door regulations.

Smoke alarms are battery and wired into the main electrical board.
